Shared Reading Sessions



We have been doing this on an informal basis since the beginning of the year, and have found there to be several benefits for some students:

- We can assess whether or not the book the student has chosen is at the correct level (if not, we can help change it)
- 4 We can assess if the book is in a suitable format for the reader.
- We can discuss the book together to increase engagement and enjoyment.
- 4 We can recommend new books based on what the student enjoys.
- 4 Offer assistance with reading eg using a coloured overlay

Reading Homework

All students in school are encouraged to read regularly at home. For some this should mean that they continue to practise reading at home with an adult or older sibling, ideally several times a week.

We've found the following techniques to be helpful:

- **4** asking the student to summarise what's recently happened in the book
- occasionally asking questions to check the student's understanding of
 the text, or a character's behaviour
- **4** stopping and clarifying the meaning of unknown words
- **4** getting the student to guess what's going to happen next
- sharing the reading a page each, with the student following the text when it's not his / her turn to read;

Websites to help you choose

The reviewing site <u>www.lovereading4kids.com</u> has a section in **Recommendations** for dyslexia-friendly stories. Each title has a synopsis, reviews written by children, an opening extract and information about the author. **Most titles can be found in the school library – just ask!**

Coloured overlays for dyslexic readers
